

Winter's Return: A Celebration in Music

Saturday, 4 December, 7:30 PM

Celebrate winter and all its diverse festivities with voices, guitars, drums, whistles, hammered dulcimer, hurdygurdy, recorder, mandolin, violin, and songs that will bring a bright spot to the darkest winter day. This special concert features Seattle's foremost nautical music duo: William Pint (guitar, octave mandolin) and Felicia Dale (hurdy-gurdy, tinwhistle), and the Kitsap Peninsula's trans-Atlantic world music team: percussionist/guitarist Mike Freeman (UK/Ireland) with multi-instrumentalist Tania Opland (Anchorage/Suquamish).

"William Pint and Felicia Dale rank among North America's most exciting interpreters of music based in the traditions of the British Isles and France... unconventional but spine-tingling... unique and mesmerizing," so says Dirty Linen magazine. William and Felicia play the music of the sea, from sea-themed contemporary songs to traditional shanties, the work songs sung aboard the tall ships to organize the labor of the crew. Those crews were English, Irish, German, French, from the West Indies, the United States and other sea going nations,

but the music itself was inspired by the oceans that link all these places together. William and Felicia take all of this as a source of inspiration for their music, giving it their own spin with guitar, hurdy-gurdy, mandolin and other exotic sounds. The result is an unusually energetic and exciting approach to folk music.

Mike Freeman and Tania Opland met in England in 1994, and have toured the UK from Shetland to the Channel Islands, Norfolk to Cornwall, Scotland and Wales. Performances in North America have ranged from Maine to the Aleutian Islands, and from British Columbia to Texas.

Mike's roots are in Eastern Europe, with grandparents from Hungary, Russia and Romania. Born and raised in Manchester, England, he spent many years in Norwich working as a designer, cabinetmaker and teacher before moving to Ireland. He has played guitar and percussion with an assortment of bands, accompanied Middle Eastern and African dance troupes, performed at countless festivals in Britain, and is featured on recordings as musician, arranger and producer. Mike's main instrument is the Gambian djembe, from which he draws amaz-

ing sounds, but he plays everything from dholak and darabouka to bones, bodhran and congas, and composes tunes on guitar and mandolin.

Originally from Alaska, Tania has traveled extensively in the U.S., Canada, Eastern Europe, Central Asia and Britain. She now lives on an Indian reservation in Washington State, her vast repertoire reflecting the diversity of the communities whose music she has shared. She has appeared on radio and TV in the U.S., Canada, Russia, Uzbekistan, Scotland, Ireland and England. Her five solo albums have received excellent reviews in acoustic music magazines on both sides of the Atlantic. From early classical training. Tania moved on to explore many different fiddle styles and a wide range of wind instruments, and such exotic instruments as chang, gidjak and doira, giving her a style rich in techniques and traditions.

This concert will be held at the Community Unitarian Universalist Church, 2819 W. Sylvester St., in Pasco. Tickets are \$11 gen./\$9 seniors and students if purchased in advance at Bookworm stores and Octopus' Garden or they are \$1 more at the door. 3RFS members receive a \$3 discount.

Laddie Ray Melvin is a folksinger and songwriter who has played music in the Pacific Northwest for many years. As a songwriter, he carefully crafts his lyrics and surrounds them with music from the American folk tradition. Country, blues, folk and folk/rock are all colors this artist works with as

he sings of life, death, family, love, hope and our shared humanity.

From Spokane, Ray has produced three independent CDs: Rocky Ground (2002); The Aftermath (2006) a collection of tunes considering what it means to be human in times of trouble; A City Glows In The Distance (2009), a collection of songs that are intentionally spare.

The Coffeehouse begins with an open mic -- come early to sign up. The Coffeehouse is held at All Saints' Episcopal Church located at 1322 Kimball Ave., Richland (drive around to the lower parking lot in the back). Jerry Harris returns for his sixth performance at First Night. Jerry is one of the most talented and soughtafter hypnotists in the country. His dynamic personality combined with his mesmerizing voice will quickly and easily induce an altered state of consciousness. Jerry's many years of professional training and experience will overcome any fears and misconceptions about hypnosis. The Celtic music performed by Skweez the Weezle has been a crowd favorite at First Night for nearly a decade. The band's musical mix includes traditional, modern and original tunes and sounds from Highland and Lowland Scotland, Ireland, Wales, Cape Breton and the U.S. The band has performed as a quartet, trio and duo throughout Washington, Oregon and Idaho at festivals, Highland Games, concerts, coffeehouses, wineries and more.

The Broadway Babes are a quartet of girls, ages 11-17, who sing Broadway tunes and other melodies with their own special twist. They have performed at First Night for the past five years and have sung the National Anthem for the Tri-City Americans and Dust Devil games and performed at numerous fundraisers.
