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# Lee Murdock: Songs of the Great Lakes

### Saturday, 18 February, 7:30 PM

Lee Murdock has uncovered a boundless body of music and stories in the Great Lakes. There is an amazing timelessness in this music. Great Lakes songs are made of hard word, hard living, ships that go down and ships that come in.

The music is grounded in the work song tradition, from the rugged days of lumberjacks and wooden sailing schooners. Lee comes alongside with ballads of contemporary commerce and revelry in the grand folk style. His fans have discovered a treasure in his songs about the Great Lakes, finding drama and inspiration in the lives of sailors and fishermen, lighthouse keepers, ghosts, shipwrecks, outlaws and everyday heroes.

With a deep understanding of the folk process, Lee's repertoire combines historical research and contemporary insights. Making folk music for the modern era, his work is a documentary and also an anthem to the people who live, work, learn and play along

the shores of the Great Lakes today. He explains, "I'm interested in trying to find the life in these songs; in mak ing music that's exciting to people today. I am looking for the songs and the interesting stories, not only for the people who already enjoy folk music, but for those who think they don't like folk music. There is a real wealth of songs and stories from the Great Lakes which have not yet been explored."

Lee composed many of these stories into songs, "because they tell such fascinating and inspiring stories of people and events, and because no song has survived from traditional sources." His musical arrangements of new and traditional folk ballads, chanteys, and work songs are enjoyed by audiences with contemporary musical tastes, even if they have not listened to much folk music in the past. With this musical style, Lee hopes to introduce folk music to new audiences. as well as entertain the serious fans of maritime and traditional music. Lee Murdock began his performing

Local guitarist and singer/songwriter, Steve Cary has been performing since he was 5, and writing music since he was 14. With a broad variety of influences – Folk-Rock to Latin, Big Band to Reggae- he calls his musical blend "Free Range Fusion." Steve grew up in Corvallis, Oregon, singing every

kind of music he could in choirs. bands, and as a soloist. He has performed classical, swing, jazz, folk, rock, and spirituals throughout the west coast. Fluent in Spanish, he writes in both English and Spanish some songs in both. When he's not performing solo, you can hear Steve around town with the eclectic rock band Romagossa Blu.

career in the Chicago area in the mid 1970s, expanding his repertoire of blues and popular music as his interest in folk music and the maritime tradition grew.

Interestingly, it was a one-week residency with the Philadelphia Folksong Society which first linked Lee's musical identity with the Great Lakes. After a week of in-school performances which they sponsored, Lee took their enthusiastic response to heart, and has been taking his Great Lakes music programs to school children and adult and family concerts ever since. Educational programs continue to be one important aspect of the 150 shows Lee presents every year in the U.S. and Canada.

Lee will perform at the Community Unitarian Universalist Church. 2819 W. Sylvester St. in Pasco. Tickets are \$11 general admission/\$9 seniors and students if purchased in advance at both Bookworm stores and Octopus' Garden and are \$1 more at the door. 3RFS members receive a \$3 discount.

# Coffeehouse Recipes

### Seven Layer Bars

- 1/2 cup unsalted butter
- 1-1/2 cups graham cracker crumbs
- 1 cup semisweet chocolate chips
- 1 cup butterscotch chips
- 1 cup chopped walnuts
- 1 (14 ounce) can sweetened
- condensed milk 1-1/3 cups shredded coconut

Preheat oven to 350 degrees F. Place butter in 13 x 9" inch pan and melt in oven. Swirl to coat bottom and sides with butter. Spread the crumbs evenly over bottom of pan. Layer chocolate chips, butterscotch chips, and the nuts over crumbs. Pour the condensed milk over nuts. Sprinkle the coconut over the condensed milk. Bake until the edges are golden brown, about 25 minutes. Let cool and enjoy!
