membership is good through December 2017. If your membership was started or renewed before 2016 Tumbleweed, it expired at the end of December 2016, so you need to renew!.



Hank & Claire Bring Pete to 3RFS Stage

Saturday, 18 February, 7:30 PM

Hank Payne and Claire Favro met in 2008 taking a course on therapeutic music. Right away they knew their-voices blended well and realized they wanted the same things musically and in life.

They both had been making live acoustic music for years, stretching back to coffee house days of the 60's though in different parts of the country. A little songwriting, the occasional paid gigs at weddings and community events, a real concert or two. "We have an enormous respect for career folksingers, those who have made a life of traveling and performing night after night. neither of us gave up our day jobs, but we kept our guitars close at hand." They also longed, each in their own way, for a

singing partner and had some wonderful short-term alliances over the years. "We really didn't know whether we could make Hank and Claire work. So when we started out at age 58 to explore the possibilities for singing, playing, collaborating, sharing lives... it was with a sense of adventure and awe. Right away we needed to figure out what Hank and Claire would represent, what would drive our choice of songs, what would make us different from any other folksinging duo. It's partly in the songs we choose to add to our repertoire. We don't care so much what style they come from-pop, jazz, gospel, folk. We don't worry about whether they are original, traditional, and/or contemporary. We are drawn to songs (and instrumentals) that touch us in the heart or in the funny bone.'

It is partly in the spirit with which they make make the songs their own and share them with audiences. They are dedicated to perpetuating the tradition of live music, recognizing its powerful potential for healing and nurturing the human spirit.

Hank and Claire got along so well that they married in 2011 and now live in the beautiful little town of Poulsbo, WA, near Seattle. Having 7 kids, 11 grandchildren, and 1 greatgrandchild between them helps to keep things in perspective!

Quinell Oucharek-One More Try with Feeling

Friday, 10 February, 7:30PM

We were all ready to bring Quinell Oucharek, a new performer to the Coffeehouse, last month, but the weather had something else in mind. Quinell, born in Alberta, Canada, grew up playing hockey. But in his family, "if we wanted to play sports, we had to do something with music too." So he played the trumpet and sang in the choir, eventually picking up the guitar. Oucharek and his family moved to the Tri-Cities when he was 12. He attended Tri-City Junior Academy in Pasco and later Columbia Basin College. After college, he spent a year teaching at his Pasco alma mater. During that

time, he recorded his album, "Till We're Free." He has a collection of standout tracks from "Hooked on a Feeling," - a song that's loosely inspired by the classic B. J. Thomas tune - to the newer "You Are Mine." On that track, he tells his great-grandparents' love story.

Quinell collaborated with Richland native and director Justin Frick on "From the Woods: Inside Llewyn Davis," a 14-minute documentary piece. Frick had the idea for the piece after watching the Coen brothers' film "Inside Llewyn Davis."

Quinell, named after Bob Dylan's song "The Mighty Quinn," has long been drawn to performers like Dylan, Cat Stevens, and James Taylor. He likes the highly-produced music of today - and finds quality in it. "But I think there's nothing really that beats the vulnerability of a solo musician on an acoustic guitar, with simple lyrics that fit a melody," he said. "I think that's why folk music hangs around. There's a line in the movie (Inside Llewyn Davis), 'if it was never new and it never gets old, then it's a folk song.'"

The evening will start with an open mic. Come early to sign up. The coffeehouse is held at All Saints' Episcopal Church, 1312 Kimball Ave., Richland (drive around to the lower parking lot in the back). Suggested donations are \$8 for general admission or \$6 for teens and seniors at the door.

on issues of labor, war, civil rights, and the environment. musical duo Hank and Claire explore how Seeger's activism inspired his music. In addition to stories about his life, each phase of his activism is illustrated with songs he wrote and/or popularized. You will learn the context for such iconic songs as "Where Have All the Flowers Gone?" and "Turn, Turn, Turn." Of course you are invited to sing along!

The second half of the program will consist of Hank and Claire's material which includes some of Hank's original songs and an assortment of contemporary and traditional folk music.
