

Tim Hall In a Rare Concert for 3RFS

Saturday, 15 February, 7:30 PM

Three Rivers Folklife Society is looking forward to presenting Tim Hall in concert on February 15. You mayhave already caught him at our Tumbleweed festival for the past two years or at the coffeehouse.

Musically, Tim thinks of himself as a coffeehouse folksinger, playing guitar, banjo, concertina, plus a smattering of other instruments. He is a purveyor of songs from the "Lost and Found" – fun songs, chorus songs, topical songs, traditional songs and ballads, novelty songs and thoughtprovoking songs for all ages.

Tim says he's been at this performing biz-ness off and on for about thirty-five years now. His efforts used to be more concerted (pun intended), most illustriously during his stint in

the topical song quartet, Shays' Rebellion. But as a solo performer he is decidedly off the grid with no CDs, no mailing list, no web site and no following to speak of. He long ago gave up any serious notion of playing music for money. A bit of travel expense reimbursement, a pleasant dinner with friends and a soft bed to land on will suffice, thank you. Tim's musical biography is straightforward. He's played guitar since the age of fifteen. He changed his musical orientation from pop and rock to folk music when he was twentysomething. Early on, the folks who really inspired him to learn folk songs and start performing were a handful of outstanding singers, most of whom are completely unknown to the general public - Sam Hinton, Michael Cooney, Joe Hickerson, Larry Hanks,

They have gone by many names but at the core of their efforts is a love of music and of the shared experiences that music brings. bass player... our love of music and desire for all members and listeners to have a good time trump our skills. We are not seeking perfection, but fun.' John Harder, Steve Devine, Helga Jansons, and Dan Henderson. Helga can point to a rediscovery of life and joy of music after a long hiatus that saw her recall days of playing piano in her native Australia. John recalls "Catch a Falling Star and

Put it in Your Pocket" as his first attempted song. This was quickly followed by singing "The Shipoopi" in his junior high's version of "The Music Man." This led to church choir partic-

John Roberts, Tony Barrand, and a few others. He considers himself a musical descendant of America's great music teacher, Pete Seeger.

His real "college" of folk music, however, was the Seattle Song Circle. This was Seattle's weekly song-swap session, attended by a handful of folk song devotees with seeming endless repertoires of traditional songs. Many communities have some version of song circles (3RFS has several) and Tim can't praise them enough for keeping non-commercial music alive and maintaining an eternal flame of traditional song and group singing that reaches back hundreds, perhaps even thousands of years.

Tim had a brief dalliance with professional music including ten years as

ipation as an adult, which had some "pretty technically cool songs to master." John now finds himself in his "Golden Years" (a David Bowie reference) and loves the comradery of "band mates sharing a common interest and having fun." Alan, Dan and Steve all point to influences by the greats of rock 'n' roll...Chuck Berry, the Rolling Stones, Eric Clapton, etc.

a solo musician, performing in pubs, coffeehouses, college cafeterias and occasional concerts. He spent a few successful years with a topical song quartet called Shays' Rebellion. That group performed in all sorts of places like union halls, peace rallies, and concert halls. They travelled as a group to Nicaragua, played the Vancouver Folk Festival, did a few tours, and even made a record album.

Today, after fifteen years of playing music at home while raising two kids, Tim is rediscovering the fun of performing and realizing more than ever that small is beautiful as in house concerts, smaller festivals and folk clubs such as Three Rivers Folklife Society. So, if you are interested in hearing folk songs, singing occasional choruses and spending an evening away from your smart-phoning, inter-webbing, computer-streaming, face-booking, unsociable media, then join us for a rare appearance of Tim Hall in concert at the the Community Unitarian Universalist Church, 2819 W. Sylvester St., in Pasco. Tickets are \$14 general admission and \$12 for 3RFS members, in advance at The Bookworm and Octopus' Garden, or at the door.
