

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

Kim Angelis Returns with Fiery Gypsy Violin

Saturday, 20 March, 7:30 PM

In the best of Gypsy fashion, Kim Angelis can change before your eyes. This internationally acclaimed composer and violin virtuoso was once described as "...transforming herself from a soft-spoken, modest and spiritual person into a wild creature of the violin with flying skirts and hair, a few broken bowstrings and stomping heels. She is the composer and performer of an international range of pieces written for specific stories and, like Vivaldi, paints the story with surprising color and detail. While her roots are from the University of California, Irvine, her violin plays like Paganini." (Clancy Hughes, Inflection Point).

You may have heard Kim's passionate, gypsy-inspired music on Network TV, PBS, NPR, or during the 2000 Olympics in Sydney, Australia, when world champion Chinese gymnast Kui Yuanyuan used Kim's music for her floor exercise. NBC gave the performance prime-time coverage,

exposing Kim's music to the world's largest audience. Kim's recent CD, "Gypsy's Odyssey," has increased her international fan base with radio airplay in Europe and Australia.

Kim began studying piano when she was 4 years old and first picked up a violin when she was 10. She remembers listening to her mother's eclectic record collection, which included "Hungarian Dances" for violin. She knew she wanted to play music like that. In addition to her mother's musical influence, Kim's great-grand mother was a British Gypsy. Kim says, "What we now commonly think of as Eastern European "Gypsy" music was actually the folk music of that region, kept alive by Rom musicians. So I have taken the varied influences of classical music, flamenco music, and Eastern European folk music, and tried to combine them into a style of my own."

Opening the concert will be an unusual acoustic group, FreeSpace. The duo consists of Ken Hoffman on Hang, and Steve Rush on guitar and vocal. Ken and Steve, from Yakima,

have been playing music together for 15 years. They are taking a short break from acoustic blues to experiment with a new sound that will leave you feeling happy, and wondering what that instrument is! Most people haven't heard of a "Hang." Hang, pronounced "hung" or "hong," means "hand" in the Bernese language (a form of German). The Hang was developed in Switzerland, and was the result of many years of research on the steelpan and the study of the diverse collection of instruments from around the world, such as gongs, drums, etc. The Hang looks like a flying saucer, is played with the hands and has a sound that is unforgettable. FreeSpace played for the 3RFS Coffeehouse 10 years ago and they are very excited to come back to the Tri-Cities.

This concert will be held at the Community Unitarian Universalist Church, 2819 W. Sylvester St. in Pasco. Tickets are \$11 gen./\$9 Srs./students purchased in advance at Bookworm stores and Octopus Garden and \$1 more at the door.

Jill Cohn Sings and Plays at Coffeehouse

Seattle singer/songwriter, pianist, and guitarist Jill Cohn has released 8 critically acclaimed CDs, including "Every Street Inside of You - Mexico City," which was released in early 2008. The CD embraces Jill's 2 years living in Mexico City, and gives the listener a heart-felt picture of the time she spent there. After suffering a year-long writers' block due to the passing of her long-time traveling

companion and pet, Tosca, Jill took a leap of faith and followed a life-long dream of living abroad for the express purpose of writing music. Cohn arrived in Mexico City in late 2005 in hopes of finding new inspiration and meaning to her life and to her song. The moment she set her hands on the lovely Kimball piano in the middle of Colonia Condessa, in the heart of the most artistic and beautiful part of Mexico City, her music began to play once again.

Jill is a self-made woman, who has more than 10 years of touring under her belt, numerous concert appearances, as well as having her songs self-placed in radio, film and television. "Mexico City" takes the listener from that online-found sub-let where the singer dug into that grand piano, through a lush collection of pop songs that are intertwined with deep feelings of the fervor it takes to save a dream from death, on into a fresh Continued on Back Page, see Cohn

Jay Howlett Donates Breedlove

Thanks (for the third year in a row!) to Jay Howlett and Blah Blah Woof Woof Music Cooperative for providing 3RFS with a Breedlove guitar as a raffle item for Tumbleweed 2010. Inspired by the Breedlove Revival designs, the Breedlove Retro Series Dreadnought/SM is one of four key "retro" models with an ear towards tradition. These fine instruments are created with the same level of craftsmanship that have made the award winning Breedlove Atlas Series so highly regarded. The Dreadnought models are extremely quick and powerful for demanding flatpicking, bluegrass and the blues. The guitar has a solid Sitka spruce top, solid mahogany back and laminate sides, rosewood finger-board, ivoroid binding with herringbone top purfling, Abalone rosette, and an L.R. Baggs Stage Pro, element active pickup system with volume and tone controls. The value of this guitar is \$1,049. Thanks to Jay, Blah Blah Woof Woof, and Breedlove for helping us keep Tumbleweed free. The raffle drawing will happen at the end of the festival on September 5.
