

Tom Rawson, Feature at 3RFS Annual Meeting

Saturday, 15 May, 7:30 PM

Three Rivers Folklife Society holds one annual "business" meeting for all members. As usual, this year, the only item of business is the election of officers and board members. After that business is done, Tom Rawson and his banjo take the stage.

Tom Rawson has made frequent appearances in 3RFS country -- at coffeehouses, concerts, and as a regular performer at Tumbleweed Music Festival. Tom shares many characteristics with the great Pete Seeger: he plays a long-neck banjo, tells a lot of stories, sings great songs, leads singalongs with enthusiasm, and ticks off a few audience members with his political views. As Hank Cramer said "Enter Tom Rawson. Witty, energetic, and armed with banjo, lap dulcimer,

and guitar, he takes the stage to warm applause from the crowd... Tom and this audience are made for each other. They know lots of songs and heck, they'll sing along even when you don't ask them to. I've seen some performers taken aback by this. Not Tom. ...He teases them, singing one called "This is NOT a sing along!" You got it: they sing along anyway -- Victory Review, March 2002

Tom has taught pre-school and primary grades in the Seattle area for 24 years. He performs regularly at children's concerts, libraries, and folk festivals. He does workshops for educators on ways to use folk tales and the art of storytelling as an integral part of a whole-language reading curriculum."Tom Rawson is the jack of all trades...a wonderful performer, excellent musician, storyteller, and teacher.

Tim's 3RFS contributions include volunteering at the Tumbleweed Music Festival and producing its last five or so TV commercials. He is also the new sound technician for the contra dances. He has a software development background that includes working in the financial securities business at Options Clearing Corporation and international accounting at Airborne Express. He has also been known to keep close track of his own finances but his contra dancing ability is far more interesting.

Frank Cuta – Secretary (Incumbent)
Frank has been active in 3RFS for many years. He provides sound at

concerts and serves on the Board and on the Tumbleweed planning committee. Fellow board members have praised his "voice of calm reason" when things get tense. He was the recording engineer for our concert album, "Front Row Seat." Duane Horton - Member at Large (Incumbent)

Sacajawea Bluegrass Festival

Friday-Sunday, 11-13 June

Our friends at Mid-Columbia Traditional Art and Music Association (MCTAMA) are again producing their annual bluegrass festival at beautiful Sacajawea State Park, just off Highway 12 east of Pasco. We're fortunate to have such a high-quality, laid-back bluegrass festival right here at home.

MCTAMA says the 2010 festival really represents the "roots and branches" as well as the traditional trunk of Bluegrass music. Featured performers include Prairie Flyer, Kathy Boyd & Phoenix Rising, Foghorn Stringband, The Bluegrass Regulators, Topstring,

and Coyote Ridge Bluegrass Wranglers. The festival also features workshops, a band scramble, vendors, plenty of jamming, camping, and a Dutch oven rendezvous.

New for 2010 is a Friday night dance, with the internationally known Foghorn Stringband, and very experienced caller Caroline Oakley. This dance is an old-fashioned type of square dance, done to live string band music. No lessons or special attire required. For those who want to attend the dance only, separate tickets are \$7.00. The dance will be 9:15 pm -11:00pm. The dance is included for Friday and weekend pass holders

Aweekend pass is \$20, if ordered by mail before June 1, or bought locally on or before Wednesday, June 9. Passes are \$25 at the gate. You can go Friday evening for \$10 or Saturday day and evening for \$15. For the Saturday evening concert only, it's \$12. The Sunday Gospel session is by donation. Age 15 and under always free if accompanied by a paying adult. See the festival website at www.sacajaweabluegrass. org. Ye Merrie Greenwood Renaissance Faire

Saturday-Sunday, 26-27 June

Ye Merrie Greenwood Faire was established in 1986 as a SunFest event. In 1989, Ye Merrie Greenwood Players, the people who produce the event, incorporated to became the only non-profit, touring Renaissance Company in the State of Washington at that time. They tour throughout the Northwest, but the Greenwood Faire is the culmination of their work. The Players are actors, dancers, and musicians of all ages. They bring Elizabethan England alive through song, dance, costuming, and environmental theatre. The company members research their own character and make their own costumes. The clothing they wear is a real expression both of the character they play and their own personality, as well as a representation of actual clothing of the times.
