

# **Dan Weber and Friend in Concert**

### Saturday, 18 November, 7:30 PM

Dan Weber is excited to be back in the Tri-Cities for a show with all proceeds to benefit one of his favorite festivals -- Tumbleweed!!

Award-winning songwriter Dan Weber has been described as "The Classic Mid-Life Overnight Sensation" after bursting onto the festival scene in 2010 to a standing ovation at the Sisters Folk Festival for his engaging set in the Dave Carter songwriting contest. Since then he's toured extensively across the country becoming a rare 3 time finalist in the legendary Kerrville 'New Folk' competition, had 2 top finishes in the Woody Guthrie songwriting contest and in 2015 won the prestigious Winfield, Kansas 'New-Song' contest for "Oh Woody," his

anthemic tribute to Woody Guthrie, rising to #2 on the Folk charts in 2015. An ex-Park Ranger, Eagle Scout, altar boy and lifelong 'Deadhead', he left his hometown of Rochester, NY in 1989 and never looked back. Living first in Seattle during the 'grunge era', then off the grid in Utah's remote **Canyonlands National Park, Weber** eventually moved back north and settled in Vancouver, WA. Along the way he picked up stories, hitchhikers and a guitar and began writing songs. Weber began performing later in life at age 40 but being a gifted storyteller, he quickly won over audiences with his natural charisma, upbeat performances, authentic songwriting, and off-the-cuff hilarious stories from the many roads he's traveled. Trillium 239 has been described as the harmonic equivalent of peanut butter and jelly; distinctly different and perfectly complementary. Playing guitars, banjo and cello, their original songs and intricate harmonies have been enticing audiences across the Northwest. Humphrey and Hartman, both performers in their own right, joined forces in the mid 90's. Cellist Michelle Cameron joined them in 2003. Strong vocals and tight harmonies continue to be the signature of their high energy performances.

Playing primarily original material, Janet and Mary's writing styles are diverse; their lyrics are gloriously unique, wrapped in silky harmony.

The addition of Michelle Cameron to the group brings both dynamic range and a new focus on unique and complex arrangements. Mary Hartman finds inspiration in

the sublime and the ridiculous. Her award-winning songs cover topics from love and mercy to goose poop and rear-end "cleavage." One fan described her pure alto voice as "filling a cathedral" and her writing reflects a wide range of musical styles. Blues, ballads and music hall "camp" are used to support Mary's thought provoking lyrics. Mary keeps a day job as a hydrogeologist, tirelessly studying wet rocks.

Janet Humphrey is a transplanted easterner and her writing style reflects her diverse musical background.

His songs have been described as "Guthrie-esque and reminiscent of early John Prine" and "A rare combination of wit, emotion and Harry Chapin-esque imagery" and the UK's Maverick Magazine said: "4 Stars: The touch of a true Master Craftsman songwriter." There's also been recognition from DJ's: "Hank and Jesus is easily the best folk song I heard last year" and The Victory Review wrote "Weber's writing is as strong as any in the Contemporary Folk community. "Goodbye to Dad" is one of the best original tunes that I have heard in a long time."

Degreed in music theory and composition, she's done commercial arranging, fronted a six-man jugband and taught fingerstyle guitar. Her love of blues is reflected in her original songs. Janet's lyric topics run the gamut from historical ballads that explore the human condition to whimsical blues about the mundane. Audience favorites include "Chocolate Reverie" and "Reds Refrigerator Rag." Several Humphrey originals have been recorded by others.

Michelle Cameron is versatile on the cello, sometimes lyrical, sometimes rhythmic, always interesting. The cello often provides a third voice to Humphrey and Hartman's alto tones. As the only lead instrumentalist, **Continued on Page 2, See Coffeehouse**

CD of classic Folk and Americana that climbed to #6 on the charts and included Oh Woody as well as the breakout hit (I Deal with) Crazy ALL Day, an everyman's anthem and crowd sing-a-long favorite, Weber is currently working on his first live recording and new material for an upcoming CD. If his phenomenal growth in such a short period of time is any indication, it promises to be his best work yet.

Dan's performance will be opened and joined by songwriter, musician, right-brain dreamer, left-brain artisan Michael Henchman. Michael began writing songs early, falling under the music spell of an eclectic range of artists in folk, jazz, funk, gospel, and the long form compositions of progrock, eventually embracing and being inspired by the work of such insightful writers as Jackson Browne, John Gorka, David Wilcox, Shawn Colvin. **Richard Shindell, and Dave Carter.** 

Michael has performed in various folk. rock-n-roll and jazz bands - as bassist, vocalist, and guitarist - and also composed instrumental music for several public television programs about Alaska. Michael's latest recording "Near and Far" is a mostly-acoustic album, exploriong characters finding their footing along wayward paths.

Michelle often does double duty, finding unique ways to sound like jazz sax or bagpipes. She even plays some screaming solos usually reserved for lead guitar (with fuzzbox). When she's not playing with the band or working her day job as a nuclear chemist, she is playing with local symphonies, sea chantey singers and anyone willing to offer bacon bribes.

As daylight disappears and the cold intensifies, it's time to contemplate winter's return. We can all embrace "Winter's Return" with the music of William Pint, Felicia Dale, Tania Opland and Mike Freeman.

Since 1995 Tania Opland and Mike Freeman have been touring the world together from home bases half a world apart, with a unique and eclectic mix of songs in several languages and acoustic music played on more instruments than any sane duo would travel with: hammered dulcimer, guitar, recorders, cittern, violin, hurdy-gurdy, Native American flute, ocarina, and percussion. Their shows feature traditional and contemporary material as well as original compositions, all presented with wit and style. Mike's irreverent sense of humor and Tania's stunning vocals provide the springboard for a roller coaster ride across several continents and back again.

William Pint and Felicia Dale have won an ardent following across the United States, Great Britain, Germany, Poland and the Netherlands with their recordings and appearances at festivals and concerts. No dead tradition, seafaring music is very much alive in the hands of Pint and Dale, and in the daily lives of people still dedicated to sailing tall ships in the 21st Century.

In a detour from their usual fare, these two remarkable pairs form a powerhouse quartet that makes music like no one else, offering a stunning

collection of songs and instrumentals with a seasonal flavor.
