When Yodeling Bill came to town We thought he was goofing around. He grew rather wistful Cried out "I'm sinistral!" And played his guitar upside-down.



Shanghaied on the Willamette in Concert

Saturday, 19 October, 7:30 PM

Shanghaied on the Willamette is the lively musical duo of Jonathan Lay and Gordy Euler. They perform songs and tunes "plundered from land and sea," including traditional Celtic, English, and Old-Time American music, especially music of the sea and waterways. They accompany their vocal harmonies with a "fleet" of acoustic instruments, including fiddle, bodhran (Irish drum), guitar (6- and 12-string), mandola, tin whistles, harmonicas and banjo.

Jonathan, whose powerful and supple voice can do justice to a gentle ballad or a rough-and-tumble sea shanty, plays guitar, tin whistle, harmonica, and a rollicking bodhran.

Gordy is a skilled vocalist and a multiinstrumentalist who easily switches among fiddle, mandola, tin whistle, guitar and banjo. This broad range of sounds allows them to craft exciting and varied arrangements and programs.

The duo's first performance together was at the 1992 Work Songs of the Sea Festival in Portland, Oregon, and they formed as Shanghaied on the Willamette in the fall of that year. Since then they have performed in festivals, pubs, outdoor markets, and concerts in Oregon, Washington, and British Columbia.

Are you curious about the name "Shanghaied on the Willamette?" In the days of sailing ships, it was a common waterfront practice to force men onto outward-bound vessels to

serve as sailors. This abduction came to be called "shanghaiing" since Shanghai, China, was a typically-remote destination. From the mid-1800s and into the early 1900s, Portland was one of the more notorious shanghaiing ports on the west coast, along with San Francisco, Astoria, and Port Townsend. The Willamette (rhymes with "dammit!") River flows through the heart of Oregon's farmland. Portland is located at the confluence of the Willamette and Columbia Rivers.

The concert will be held in the Community Unitarian Universalist Church, 2819 W. Sylvester St., in Pasco. Ticket prices are \$11 general admission/\$9 seniors and students. \$1 more at the door. 3RFS members receive a \$3 discount.

Bill Staines Coffeehouse Concert

Friday, 11 October, 7:30 PM

No tricks; you're in for a real treat when Bill Staines performs at our October Coffeehouse!

For more than forty years, Bill has traveled back and forth across North America, singing songs and delighting audiences at festivals, folksong societies, colleges, concerts, clubs, and coffeehouses. A New England native, Bill became involved with the Boston-Cambridge folk scene in the early 1960s and for a time, emceed the Sunday Hootenanny at the legendary Club 47 in Cambridge. Bill quickly became a popular performer in the Boston area. From the time in 1971 when a reviewer from the Boston Phoenix stated that he was "simply Boston's best perform-

er," Bill has continually appeared on folk music radio listener polls as one of the top all time favorite folk artists. Now, well into his fifth decade as a folk performer, he has gained an international reputation as a gifted songwriter and performer.

Singing mostly his own songs, he is one of the most popular and durable singers on the folk music scene today, performing nearly 200 concerts a year and driving over 65,000 miles annually. He weaves a blend of gentle wit and humor into his performances. One reviewer wrote, "He has a sense of timing to match the best standup comic." He has recorded 26 albums! Bill's music is a slice of Americana, reflecting with the same ease his feelings about the prairie people of the

Midwest or adventurers of the Yukon, on-the-road truckers or everyday workers that make up this land.

"Folk music is rich in the human spirit and experience. I've always wanted to bring something of value to people through my songs." With these thoughts, Bill continues to drive the highways and back roads of the country year after year, bringing his music to listeners, young and old.

Instead of the usual open mic, singersongwriter Becky McGuigan will play an opening set. Becky cut her musical teeth in the 1960s and 1970s. She writes her own material and chooses her repertoire from obscure folk material that can't be considered "covers," and are often humorous.

Traditional singer Sara Grey will do an intimate house concert at Micki Perry's home in Kennewick. Sara grew up in New Hampshire but has lived in Scotland for many years. She recently relocated to North Carolina and is currently on tour in the western U.S., doing programs and concerts about the connections between British Isles music and pioneer/western music, especially cowboy songs.

Her concerts are always both inform ative and entertaining and she is especially proficient at playing the claw-hammer banjo. You'll love her accent and her stories and the downhome atmosphere of a house concert. Sara accompanies her lovely voice by frailing a five-string banjo and when she is playing tunes it is obvious why she is regarded as one of the foremost exponents of the old-time style.

As a youngster in North Carolina she first heard a lot of mountain music and carried this interest into her adult life studying folklore and collecting and performing music from the various areas in which she has lived. She combines storytelling, educational insights about the migration of folksongs, a joyous love of music and her craft into an entertaining package that is both delightful and enlightening.
