


Calling All Cowboys and Cowgirls

Welcome Mare Wakefield to 3RFS

Saturday, 29 September, 7:30 PM

Singer/songwriter Mare Wakefield has been described as "Oregon cafes, small Texas towns and twangy Nashville rolled into one." Another reviewer asks, "Could she be the merger of Maria McKee, Natalie Merchant, Shawn Colvin and Dolly Parton?" And yet another compares her to Dar Williams and Johnny Cash. Hard to imagine? You'll just have to come and listen for yourself.

"Daddy was a seeker," says Mare (pronounces "Mary.") "Eventually he became a Salvationist minister. Mama was more of a gypsy, loving nothing more than a long, clear stretch of open highway."

Mare grew up with wanderlust embedded in her DNA, and lived in eight different places by the time she was 10 years old. "It was a roller-coaster way to grow up, but my brother and I learned to fit in fast," she says. "We had our rural Wisconsin accents down in two weeks flat, and eighteen months

later we were drawling like native Texans."

This versatility and love for travel is evident in Mare's music as well. Listeners roam through Arizona deserts, Oklahoma oil fields and South Dakota plains, and take side-trips to ancient Babylon or the streets of Amsterdam. The journeys go inward too, exploring valor and valentines, hope and heartbreak, and the occasional whiskeysoaked barroom brawl. Story and song are woven seamlessly together by Mare's intimate delivery and gift for melody. Currently based in Nashville, Mare continues her journey by cowriting with hit songwriters and burning up the highways with her pianoplaying husband (aptly named Nomad!) and Martin acoustic guitar in tow.

Mare has five CDs to her credit starting with 'Girlfriend' in 1997. The other four are 'Factory' in 1999, 'Take Me Home' in 2005, 'Ironwood' in 2008 and her latest 'Meant To Be' that came out in 2011. "'Take Me Home' is Wakefield's fourth album, and her

first in four years. She relies on both acoustic and electric arrangements, and even strips things down to one voice, one guitar on 'Lullaby.' The piano also adds an extra element to many tracks. 'Take Me Home' sounds great, and Wakefield's an expressive singer. "~ Sing Out Magazine

Tickets are \$11 general admission and \$9 seniors and students if purchased in advance at Bookworm stores and Octopus' Garden. Tickets at the door are \$1 more. 3RFS members receive a \$3 discount.

Laddie Ray Melvin at Coffeehouse

Laddie Ray Melvin is a folk singer who has played music in the Pacific Northwest for many years. He's also a songwriter who carefully crafts his lyrics and surrounds them with music from the American folk tradition. Country, blues, folk, and folk-rock are all colors on his palette as he sings of life, death, work, family, love, hope, and our shared humanity.

Laddie Ray has produced three independently recorded CDs in the last decade. The first album is 'Rocky Ground,' a personal journey, the second is 'In the Aftermath,' a collection of tunes that considers what it means to be human in times of trouble. His third CD is 'A City Glows in the Distance,' a collection of songs that are intentionally spare, each a live take. The stories these songs tell are about the way characters see the

world they inhabit.

There will be an open mic session to start off the evening. Come early to sign up if you want to perform. Slots are limited. The coffeehouse is held at All Saints' Episcopal Church, at 1312 Kimball Avenue, Richland (drive around to the lower parking lot in the back). Suggested donations are \$8 general admission or \$6 teens and seniors at the door.

Sacajawea **Heritage Days**

Friday-Saturday, 28-29 September

The Mid-Columbia Traditional Arts and Music Association (MCTAMA) presents Sacajawea Heritage days every fall to teach and re-enact the life and skills of the early American explorers, the Native American cultures they found along the way, and the lives of the early settlers. The event was first presented in 2003 by the local Lewis & Clark Bicentennial Council to commemorate the 200th anniversary of the Lewis and Clark Voyage of Discovery. MCTAMA has presented the event since 2006, and they hope you love this event as much as they do.

Heritage Days runs for two days, Friday through Saturday. Friday is dedicated to receiving school children and letting them see and touch what used to be. Saturday is when most people show up to experience the past. There will be Lewis & Clark re-enactors, members of the Umatilla and Yakama Nations, and the Wanapums, along with mountain man encampments, local museums, and other people who enjoy sharing their skills and knowledge about what life was

like nearly two centuries ago.

On Saturday night there is a bonfire and many people who are encamped at the park, as well as many more, show up to play music, sing, tell stories, and just have a good time. The campfire program starts at around 7:30 PM.

Heritage Days 2012 will be held at Sacajawea State Park, just off of State Highway 12, near Pasco. It's absolutely free on Saturday because the \$10 access fee, or requirement to have a Discover Pass (\$30 annual fee) is being waived by all of Washington State Parks on that day. The access fee or Discover Pass requirement will be in force on Friday. Official government vehicles (meaning school buses) do not get charged the access fee.
