Bluegrass and originals from Homebrew Stringband

Saturday, October 21, 7:30 PM All Saints' Episcopal Church

Homebrew Stringband from Spokane will bring an eclectic mix of blues, bluegrass, old-time, and original songs in concert on Saturday, October 21st, 7:30 pm at All Saints Episcopal Church, 1322 W. Kimball Avenue in Richland. The concert will be upstairs in the sanctuary, but park in back and enter through the basement. Tickets are \$20, \$15 for members, and can be purchased at the door or in advance online at http://www.3rfs.org.

Homebrew Stringband teams the husband and wife duo Gary and Alyse Reed with Spokane's versatile multi-instrumentalist Brad Keeler. Brad was originally scheduled to do our February concert, but had to cancel at the last minute due to Covid. He played with the Homebrew Stringband at Tumbleweed this year and the trio is delighted to return to play a concert for us.

Gary and Alyse Read have also played at Tumbleweed in the past as the Foggy Noggin String Band with Chris Davidson and Sherri Fulgham of Saint September in 2018. They have played in several other Puget Sound area bluegrass bands including Pickled Okra, as well as performed as a duo. Gary plays guitar and mandolin, does vocals, and is a former folk rocker. Alyse plays stand-up bass and banjo, and also sings and brings her years as a bluegrass musician to the mix. Brad Keeler, who is a singer songwriter and plays guitar, banjo, mando, and dobro, has played in a variety of groups as well as being a solo artist. He is adept at blues, bluegrass, old-time, and classic folk and

roots music. Expect a little of this, a little of that, and a whole lot of fun when the Homebrew Stringband brews up an aural concoction of string tunes with an array of songs featuring two and three part harmonies sure to please your musical palate.

"RICHLAND" FILM FEATURES 3RFS TALENT

A documentary film on Richland will be shown on October 13 at 8 PM and again on October 15 at 1:25 PM, at the Uptown Theatre in Richland as part of TRIFI, the Tri-Cities International Film Festival. Entitled Richland, the film premiered at the Tribeca Film Festival in New York City in June and has been described by The Hollywood Reporter as "A sensitive portrait of the American dream and the fallout of a nuclear legacy." The film, by Irene Lusztig, a University of California - Santa Cruz professor of film and digital media, notably features Tri-City talent, poetry from Kathleen Flenniken's book Plume, and Mid-Columbia Master Singers performing parts of Nuclear Dreams, by Nancy Welliver and Reg Unterseher. And, from the 3RFS perspective, to again quote The Hollywood Reporter, "Haunting in different ways Linda Allen's 1989 song Termination Winds is heard twice in the film memorably. A man in a diner delivers an off-the-cuff a cappella version that accentuates hometown love and fortitude in the face of scrubland adversity, and two women with banjo and guitar on the dusty road near the Hanford Site, imbue the number with the lilting pang of a protest song." The Termination Winds song concept and title were suggested in 1988 by John and Micki Perry. The two women performing the song are Mary Hartman and Janet Humphries of Trillium-239. The man in the diner [the Spudnut Shop] is Gene Carbaugh. The film festival is the only scheduled Tri-Cities showing of the film.
