Reggie Garrett Returns with Cellist Christine Gunn

Saturday, November 18, 7:30 PM All Saints' Episcopal Church

It has been many years since the Three Rivers Folklife Society last hosted urban acoustic folk songwriter Reggie Garrett in concert, but we are pleased to have him return with cellist Christine Gunn on Saturday, November 18th, 7:30 pm at All Saints' Episcopal Church, 1322 Kimball Avenue in Richland. The concert will be upstairs in the sanctuary, but please enter through the basement by the parking lot in the rear of the church. Admission is \$20 and \$15 for members of 3RFS. Purchase tickets at the door or online at 3rfs.com.

Reggie Garrett and Christine Gunn paired up as a duo about two years ago, soon after Reggie moved from Seattle to Olympia, where Christine also lives. Reggie has always embraced a variety of forms, traditions, and styles including rock, folk, blues, soul, gospel, and Latin beats, as well as composing deeply personal songs from the heart. As John Platt of NewFolk.org puts it, Reggie's originals "set a mood and tell stories and reveal harsh truths with power." Many of his newer songs on York's Lament and Other Stories, which rode to #5 on the NACC folk radio charts, also allude to black experience and history, such as the title song about the black member of the Lewis and Clark expedition, and "The Ballade de Stacie Aⁿ about Stacie Abrams. Other CDs by Reggie Garrett or Reggie Garrett and the Snake Oil Peddlers include: Welcome to My World, Time Stands Still, Seasons, and Something New.

Christine Gunn, who is more than just an accompanist in the duo, is a classically influenced cellist/composer who also performs in Olympia's Treehouse Symphony and has

performed extensively throughout the Northwest and Europe with Seattle legends The Walkabouts, and as a founding member of the classically influenced acoustic trio Trillian Green. Though she is a self-taught musician, her original compositions have accompanied independent films and performance pieces at festivals worldwide. She has one CD: Voice of the <u>Trees</u>. Christine and Reggie don't have a CD as a duo yet, but they are enjoying touring as well as just doing music together in their hometown. This will be a great opportunity to hear a unique duo performing amazing eclectic music from many traditions in a rich musical tapestry with luminosity.

Teale Love and the Nyckelharpa at the November Coffeehouse

Friday, November 10, 7:00 PM All Săints' Episcopal Church

Our November coffeehouse features Teale Love playing the nyckelharpa. We met Teale at Art in the Park last July when he filled in between acts on the stage and we fell in love with his music (and him)! He also has recently played for the International Folk Dancers of Richland, and the Sons of Norway. Now living the life of a retiree in West Richland, Teale is a former fire fighter, code enforcer, vegetable farmer, and draft horse and buggy purveyor of historic tours in northern California. He began playing violin at age 12, quit in college, and resumed 35 years ago after being inspired by a Chieftains concert. For 30 years he played traditional Irish music, old time country, and bluegrass as a member of the band Uncorked.

The nyckelharpa is the national folk instrument of Sweden and its name translates as "keyed fiddle". Similar in appearance to a fiddle or violin, it also bears some similarities to the hurdy-gurdy and sitar. The oldest surviving nyckelharpa dates back to 1526. The modern version, introduced in the early 20th century, has 16 strings: 3 melody strings, one drone, and 12 sympathetic strings. Played with a bow, the musician uses 37 wooden keys to provide notes for the melodies.

Teale would love to find some people who would be willing to learn to play a simple version of the nyckelharpa, and also people with whom he could play traditional Irish music.

Don't miss this opportunity not only to hear something unusual, but to welcome a relative newcomer to the Tri-Cities and 3RFS!

Admission is \$8 for 3RFS members/\$10 for non-members and the show starts at 7 PM with an open mic. Come early if you would like to sign up for a performance slot. The coffeehouse is hosted at the All Saints' Episcopal Church at 1322 Kimball Avenue in Richland.

December Coffeehouse Kay Miracle

Kay Miracle grew up in Benton City in a musical family. She received her first guitar from her grandfather, Claude Wood, a guitar player who backed up both Hank Williams and Doris Day. Her musical journey began at an early age performing with her sister as "The Miracle Sisters" at various State Fairs and TV shows. As a senior, Kay won the "Best Talent Award" in the "Miss Washington" pageant and was awarded a college music scholarship for an original song she wrote and performed. When she was in college she played in rock, folk, and bluegrass bands. After college she toured with Pacific Air Force and USO bands for 7 years before settling in Syracuse, New York. She was lead singer, guitarist, and songwriter for the alternative country band Reckless Driver, had her own band Kay and the Miracle Cure, and was also in the duo Ghost Town Ramblers. She has showcased her original songs at the SXSW Women TeXchromosome showcases in Austin TX, as well as Highway Woman radio show while touring with the "Last Honky Tonk Train" songwriter series.

She has been certified as a Creative Facilitator using music and art for healing, and founded the "Blood for Ink" program to encourage veterans to write songs that tell their personal stories. Kay has won many songwriting awards for her original songs including being a finalist several times in Tumbleweed's Jane Titland Memorial Songwriting Contest. She has now returned to her roots in Benton City to make her home.
