2019 Tumbleweed Music Festival

Plan to stay in town over Labor Day weekend or you will miss the 23rd Annual Tumbleweed Music Festival to be held in Howard Amon Park in Richland, on August 30, 31 and September 1. The festival is produced and sponsored by Three Rivers Folklife Society and cosponsored by the City of Richland with additional support from local and regional sponsors such as The Entertainer, Print Plus, Northwest Public Radio, Blue Dog RVs, Battelle, the Tri-City Herald and Northwest Public Broadcasting.

Tumbleweed is a free, family-oriented festival. It is the only one of its kind in the Tri-Cities and has become one of the most popular acoustic music festivals in the Northwest. There will be an eclectic mix of about 120 local, regional and national acts on six outdoor and indoor stages, representing a multitude of musical genres: international, traditional and contemporary folk, Celtic, nautical, old-time, bluegrass, blues, and even some folk rock music. The River Stage will feature blocks of music and storytelling geared for children and families as well as hands-on art activities. There will also be an open mic stage, run by Tri-Tech, where folks who are brave enough can showcase their talents.

Festival participants will conduct free music and dance workshops and there will also be an indoor dance stage inside the air-conditioned Community Center. In addition to music and dance performances, workshops galore, and jam sessions as well, there are plenty of arts and crafts booths and an assortment of festival foods available. There is something for everyone at Tumbleweed!

Each year at Tumbleweed there is the juried Jane Titland Memorial Songwriting Contest. Ten finalists perform their original songs at the festival and the winner also performs at the Saturday evening concert. This year, the theme for the contest is "Power of Song."

There will also be a free concert on Sunday evening in which more than a dozen performers will sing songs with this "Power of Song" theme as we celebrate 23 years of making music together.

Another popular event at the festival is The Dave Oestreich Memorial Band Scramble on Sunday afternoon where ad hoc bands are drawn from a hat, and will perform two songs or tunes after one hour of practice together.

The free concert on Friday night, August 30, at 6:30 PM, will feature local youth bands and talented single performers with an eclectic mix of acoustic folk, indie rock, and possibly even country on the North Stage. It's a great way to showcase local talent and to kick off the festival, which will appeal to all ages and is free to the public from 11:00 AM-7:00 PM on Saturday and Sunday.

Saturday night's concert will begin at 7:00 PM on the North Stage. This is a paid event, with tickets on sale at the festival's Information Booth. The \$14/\$12 seniors and students admission cost is a bargain for three wonderful acts: Cosmo's Dream, The Drunken Maidens, and Tom Rawson and Ellen van der Hoeven. Dan Maher, the host of NWPB's Inland Folk, will be the emcee for the show.

A contra dance in the Richland Community Center's dance area will

conclude the festival at 8:00 PM on Sunday. Admission is \$8. Contra dancing is related to English, New England and Southern style country dancing and also American square dancing. It is easy to learn, no partner needed and fun for all ages.

Emily Faulkner and Mitchell Frey, will teach all the dance moves progressively throughout the evening, so no experience is necessary. The Contra dance band Prestwold Players will provide the live music for the dance. There will also be a free "Contra Dance 101" workshop at 5:45-6:30 PM on Sunday to prepare novices for the dance.

Special thanks to our sponsors, performers, vendors, audience, and volunteers. Volunteers are the backbone of the festival. Throughout our 23 year history, Tumbleweed has gained a reputation as one of the friendliest and most community-oriented Northwest acoustic music festivals because of the sense of family and community involvement in the interaction of performers and their audience. Saturday Night Concert Headliners

Saturday, 31 August, 7:00 PM

Our reasonably priced Saturday night concert (\$14/\$12 seniors and students) will feature the following performers along with the "Power of Song" songwriting contest winner.

Americana trio Cosmo's Dream sings original tales of foggy-mountain megamalls, trailer-park guns and guitars, rising rivers, grandmas online, dark days ahead and Superman's dilemma. This Tacoma-based trio featuring Gen Obata on flatpick guitar and mandolin, Steve Nebel on guitar, and Kristi Nebel on bass, blends acoustic musicianship with solo vocals and dynamic three-part harmonies.

The Drunken Maidens was initially formed by Liz Savage, with friends Helen Gilbert and Lori Bellamy. Elaine Bradtke joined the fray, adding exciting new vocal arrangements. Then the talented Maidens began bringing instruments into their repertoire too, with guitar, fiddle, mandolin, and whistles. Along the way the promise of whiskey and fun enticed Cat Fox to join and their sound was rounded out with percussion, mountain dulcimer and more.

Tom Rawson, folksinger and storyteller from Eastsound, WA, is the West Coast's own version of Pete Seeger. Armed with longneck banjo and other weapons of mass delight, Tom is a master of warmth and wit who loves to share his musical treasures with an 'I know something you don't know and you're gonna love it too' kind of smile. Ellen van der Hoeven is a singer/songwriter from Vancouver. Her songs are influenced by her rich background in British, Irish, Canadian and American folk. She accompanies her songs on guitar and mandolin, and is noted for her expressive singing style. From gospel to contemporary, profound to downright silly, Tom and Ellen will have you singing, clapping, and laughing along all night.

Mark & Cindy Lemaire in Concert

Saturday, 21 September, 7:30 PM

Mark Lemaire is known for his unique guitar style: he incorporates masterful fingerpicking, slap-and-tap harmonics, hand percussion, and a delicate touch that goes straight to your heart. While Mark's solo guitar pieces stand as complete statements, his harmonies with Cindy Lemaire are so perfectly matched that they seem like two people with one voice.

At a show, audiences do a lot of laughing, but many are also moved to tears. The material runs from tongue-in-cheek songs about married life to stories of the strange surprise of middle age creeping up on us. The music ranges from subtle, pin-drop delicate solo guitar to raucous sing-alongs.

With four albums released and even more captivating songs you'll only hear live (for now), Mark and Cindy are a pleasure to listen to and fun to just be with.

Mark Lemaire has been performing on guitar since he was twelve. Originally from New England, by high school he was writing songs and playing the coffeehouses in Boston and Cambridge. At 23, his musical world changed when he landed a job as a recording engineer at the legendary Euphoria Soundworking with producer Jimmy Miller, who produced The Rolling Stones, Blind Faith, Traffic, and the Spencer Davis Group. Then tendonitis forced Mark to perform a little less and engineer a little more. He found time to record his guitar solo CD "Rubato, Pieces for Guitar," as well as many of the songs that appear on "Practice Makes Perfect." Cindy van Empel Lemaire has been singing since her youth. In high school in Southern California, she sang in a band that covered REO Speedwagon and Led Zeppelin. Mark met Cindy in early 2008. It was immediately clear how perfectly their voices blended.

Then Mark asked Cindy if she would please learn a few of his songs. And so she did.

They have been performing together as Mark and Cindy Lemaire ever since they got married in 2014. They tour New England every summer, and California appearances have included shows in Carmel Valley, Berkeley, Los Angeles, San Francisco, and many places in between. On their European vacation in the fall of 2011, they busked on the streets of Italy and Croatia. In autumn of 2012, they released their new album "Home Isn't Home" -- based around their unique vocal blend combined with Mark's inimitable guitar style.

This concert will be held at the Community Unitarian Universalist Church, 2819 W. Sylvester St., in Pasco. Tickets are \$14 general admission and \$12 3RFS members, either in advance at The Bookworm in Kennewick and Octopus' Garden in Richland, or at the door.
