

Matt Hammer: Then and Now

Saturday, 20 February, 7:30 PM

If you remember Matt Hammer you are probably over 50 years old and lived in the Tri-Cities back in the 1970s. Matt used to perform at a place called "Chapter 11," which was located on Clearwater in the building that is now the home of the Department of Motor Vehicles. Now there's a claim to fame!

Music has always been Matt's lifetime passion. At eighteen (1970) he started entertaining and hitchhiking his way through the American countryside, from Chicago to San Francisco. Arriving in Alaska in 1976, he fell in love with her rugged, intrinsic beauty and spent decades there, only recently moving "outside" to the Lower 48, where he and his wife Lona resettled in Kennewick, to be closer to family.

Mark opened for many acts playing the Alaska circuit: Emmylou Harris, Bonnie Raitt, Hoyt Axton, Jerry Jeff Walker, Steve Goodman, and Air Supply. Wherever there is music in the air, you'll find Matt: Talkeetna Bluegrass Festival, Alaska State Fair, and more recently Tumbleweed Music Festival, to name just a few.

Matt established The Great Alaskan Opry in 1990, creating an expressive forum for some of Alaska's finest musical talent. He also performed for many years at fund-raising events in support of Colonel Norman Vaughn's Iditarod efforts. He helped produce and record the 1994 "It's Marvelous Adventure" music video in support of Colonel Vaughn's climb up Mt. Vaughan in Antarctica at age 89.In the mid-1990s Matt joined forces with longtime friend Loren Arment to form the Arment/Hammer Band. The CD "Alaskasongs" was released in 1998 to critical acclaim. In 2005 Matt formed The Matt Hammer Band and performed throughout south-central

Alaska. Since then, Matt performed with his wife Lona in Alaska and on trips to Seattle, Nashville, and New Orleans. His performances still contain many songs and stories about his life in the last frontier.

After returning to Kennewick, Matt attended the 2014 Tumbleweed Music Festival, joined the Band Scramble, and won the trophy! He had so much fun, he played an entire set at the 2015 festival. After that show he could be heard saying, "Well... now I'm hooked!" Now Matt is kindly playing this show as a benefit for our 2016 Tumbleweed Music Festival!

SSSSS - Proven Health Benefits!

Saturday, 13 February, 7:00 PM

Those of us who sing in choirs, or in friendly groups like Three Rivers Folklife Society know that something fabulous happens when we raise our voices with others. Our spirits lift. Stress and anxiety fade. Our breathing becomes calmer. We laugh easily. We feel contented, yet energized. Scientists and psychologists think this is due to chemical changes triggered by the experience of singing in a group. And - wonderful news! - it doesn't have to be a particularly good singing group! In an article for Psychology of Music, U.K. authors Betty Bailey and Jane Davidson, published "Effects of group singing and performance for marginalized and middle-class singers." They report on an investigation with members of a choir for homeless men, which indicated that group singing at the most amateur levels of musical ability still yielded considerable emotional, social and cognitive benefits. Similarly, in her book, Imperfect Harmony: Finding Happiness Singing with Others, Stacy Horn reports on her own experience as a less-thanstellar singer in a community choir.
