Canadian Songwriter James Keelaghan

Friday, November 22, 7:30 PM All Saints' Episcopal Church

Join us for a special Friday evening concert with <u>James Keelaghan</u> accompanied by <u>David Woodhead</u>.

Contemporary folk songs, at their very best, offer an insight into the hardships, attitudes, and resolve of characters and events that shape our day-to-day lives. You can dress these songs up in inspired arrangements and intricate instrumentation but, at their very essence, the archetypal folk song is all about stories. Stories and people. Something such compelling songwriters as Eric Bogle, Si Kahn, Ewan MacColl, and Stan Rogers all understood and mined so effectively.

James Keelaghan, too, burrows into that same rich seam with equal ability and comparable conviction.

Originally from Calgary, but now living in Perth, Ontario, Keelaghan is an internationally known artist. Throughout a career that now spans almost four decades, the Juno and Canadian Folk Music Award winner has created a repertoire of incalculable importance – a unique body of work, either inspired by or drawn from the folk tradition. Fusing his insatiable appetite for finding the next unique storyline, he forges his pieces with brilliantly defined craftsmanship and a monogrammed artistic vision, making him one of the most distinctive and readily identifiable voices of not only the Canadian scene, but as a member of the international singer-songwriter community.

Armed with a songbook that has

enlightened and enthralled, and been embraced, by audiences around the world, Keelaghan's life as an artist is one that is a perpetual journey on so many levels. Most importantly it's a journey that has invited fans of literate and layered songwriting to be a part of his artistic expeditions, some that weave their way through marvelously etched stories of a historical nature with underlying universal themes, and others that mine the depths of the soul and the emotional trails of human relations. His masterful story telling, over the course of ten recordings, has been part of the bedrock of his success, earning Keelaghan his share of nominations and awards, and acclaim from Australia to Scandinavia. Originals from the Keelaghan cannon are entering the folk music cannon. Most notably, "Small Rebellion" (highlighting the 1931 slaughter of peaceful striking miners in Bienfait, Saskatchewan); "Hillcrest Mine" (a prelude to the worst coal mining disaster in Canadian history); "Kiri's Piano" (a triumph over adversity amidst the shameful, racist treatment of Japanese-Canadians during WW II); and "Cold Missouri Waters" (a harrowing portrait of the 1949 Mann Gulch Fire in the mountains of Montana) His latest album, Second Hand, is a collection that features both solo efforts and writing collaborations. Even if you aren't familiar with him, you may recognize some of his songs from having heard Hank Cramer perform them.

David Woodhead has had a truly wide-ranging and dynamic career, evolving a distinctive melodic and textural approach that he can mold to fit almost any situation.

You've probably seen David's name listed on the backs of recordings in your collection. He's appeared on some 300 projects, and worked with many

influential artists including Perth County Conspiracy, Stan Rogers, Oliver Schroer, Gil Scott-Heron, and David Sanborn. His live gigs have included working with Malagasy guitarist Donné Roberts (a recent Juno nominee), classical-folk fusioneers Ensemble Polaris and veteran jazzers Manteca, and touring internationally with master songwriter James Keelaghan. David has done instruction at the Folk Alliance International conference (Kansas City), Haliburton Winter Folk Camp, the Goderich Celtic College, and Ontario's The Woods. He's been an invited guest improvisor at Arraymusic and at Casey Sokol's improv soirées at York University, and has done a Music Residency at the Banff Centre, working on music which led to his most recent Confabulation CD, Tunnels and Visions. Recently he's been taking part in various events involving Quebecois and Balfolk (European folk dance) music, playing tenor banjo and mandolin.

His own music draws from the intimacy of the folk world, the harmonic sensibilities of jazz, and a sense of precision from classical arranging, with room for freedom in individual expression and improvisation. David's Confabulation ensemble has a somewhat exotic and rambunctious nature, while the more recent Oriana Quartet is focused on taking a folk-jazz chamber music approach.

Since 2007, Fae Wiedenhoeft and her band SeaStar have been entertaining audiences. SeaStar hails from the rainy town of Seattle, rocks like a gale, and woos like a summer wind. For the last 16 years this band has been generating original Celtic, Folk, Maritime, and Americana music with a Pacific Northwest spin. Deeply rooted in the stories of the West Coast and the Celtic worlds, every note has the essence of the fisherfolk, the selkies, the mountains, the tides, and the blackberry breeze. Their award winning, traditional sounding compositions and clever story songs are loved and revered by many. They have taken their love of musical storytelling around the world including the US, Canada, Ireland and Scotland, England, France, Poland, and Türkiye.

They have played at festivals, concert halls, coffeehouses, house concerts, hardware stores and even video arcades, and will return to the Tri-Cities

Here are some of the new opportunities (which also means "needs") within our organization and their brief descriptions. Concert Producers: Arrange the concert details including making sure we have a ticket seller, refreshments, door prizes, emcee, helping with publicity, opening and closing the performance venue. For the 2024-2025 season, we have the performers pretty much in place, but for the 2025-2026 season the producer could also play a major part in selecting performers and arranging their details (e.g., schedule & housing.)

Calendar Updates: There are numerous calendars (online and print) that cover events in the Tri-Cities. We need someone who could submit updates (typically online) for our various events to the various calendars. The updates are one- or two-line postings, rather than detailed descriptions.

Concert/Event Refreshments: Do you enjoy the refreshments we have at concerts and our other events? We could use a few more people willing to bring snacks and beverages and help with setup and cleanup after the event. Typically need to be there 30 minutes before and/or after the event.

Folk Talk Contributing Writers: Each issue of our Folk Talk Newsletter has articles describing and promoting the concert and coffee house performers for the upcoming month. The need is for someone to use the promotional material the performer provides, perhaps from their website or Facebook page, or from direct contact with or knowledge of the performer, and write the nominal half-page article for each. Articles need to be ready for the newsletter about a month in advance of the event.

Newsletter Labeling and Mailing: For the newsletters and promotional post cards that we mail out, preprinted labels must be manually applied and the materials delivered for bulk mailing to the Kennewick Post Office.

Folk Talk Newsletter Editor: Katrina Knight has been faithfully editing our newsletter for 4 years now and has announced that she needs to step down from that position to allow her to focus her efforts on coordinating the Tumbleweed Music Festival and producing *Dan Maher's Good Road* internet radio show. The position

requires using computer publishing software to create the newsletter using the templates we currently have, and assuring that we contributors provide material in a timely fashion. The electronic files are sent to our printer for hard-copy production, and to our webmaster for posting. Katrina will mentor her replacement!

As you can see, there is no shortage of opportunities to serve! We really do need to find people to fill these vital roles. Perhaps you know someone who would enjoy contributing to the 3RFS community in this way. Thanks for considering your additional involvement to keep 3RFS alive and healthy.

band Kay and the Miracle Cure, and was also in the duo Ghost Town Ramblers. She has showcased her original songs at the *SXSW Women* TeXchromosome showcases in Austin TX, as well as *Highway Woman* radio show while touring with the "Last Honky Tonk Train" songwriter series.

Kay has won many songwriting awards for her original songs, including being a finalist several times in Tumbleweed's Jane Titland Memorial Songwriting Contest.

David Adams is an acoustic guitar player and singer-songwriter hailing from the rolling hills of upstate New York. With a passion for storytelling through music, David crafts original songs about life and love. His recent move to the Tri-Cities area has infused his performances with a fresh energy, entertaining audiences with his acoustic renditions of rock, indie, pop, and folk tunes.
