Joel Underwood Concert

Saturday, April 19, 7:30 PM Allied Arts Gallery at the Park

Folksinger and music historian Joel Underwood travels the Pacific Northwest performing his three "Portrait Performances:" Woody Guthrie, Hank Williams, and Bob Dylan. He is an actor, teacher, musician, and historian. After 25 years teaching high school history, Underwood got his master's degree in American History with a focus on folk and protest music. A recipient of the Woody Guthrie Fellowship, Underwood was granted access to the Guthrie Archives in Tulsa, Oklahoma, to research Woody's time in the World War II Merchant Marines.

His evenings are not strictly concerts, plays, or lectures, but combine all three elements, giving audiences insight into the stories behind the songs as well as the chance to sing along. Saturday April 19th, at 7:30 pm at the Allied Arts Gallery at the Park, 89 Lee Blvd Richland, Underwood and his trusty guitar will flip a coin in front of the audience and launch into either his "Move It On Over: Stories and Songs of Hank Williams" or "Blowin' In The Wind" and treat attendees to the music and lore of Bob Dylan. Will it be "Tangled Up In Blue" or "Your Cheatin' Heart?" Not even Joel will know until the coin lands! Come and enjoy a night of music, history, and magic.

Joel Underwood Community Lecture Series That Ribbon of Highway: Woody Guthrie in the Pacific Northwest

Thursday, April 17, 7:00 PM Richland Public Library

Folksinger and activist Woody Guthrie composed 26 songs in 30 days while riding along the Columbia River and touring the Grand Coulee Dam Project in 1941. With his unique, authentic voice, he chronicled both the grandeur and the perils of what he called "The Greatest Thing That Man Has Ever Done" as an employee of the Bonneville Power Administration. His time here in the Pacific Northwest inspired a swell of patriotism that led Guthrie to enlist in the U.S. Merchant Marine in World War II, after which he returned home to fame and notoriety, but also to tragedy and tremendous personal loss.

Historian, teacher, folksinger, and actor **Joel Underwood** performs an hour that is part concert, part theatrical drama, and part lecture. Sing along to "Roll on Columbia," "Pastures of Plenty," and of course, "This Land is Your Land," and learn the—sometimes hilarious, sometimes tragic—stories behind the songs.

Tumbleweed 2025 Preparations' Progress

Preparations for the 29th annual Tumbleweed Music Festival are well underway, with applications being received at the normal increasing tempo for this time of year.

As of this writing, we have 55 Performer applications (out of an expected 105 -115), five entries into the Jane Titland Memorial Songwriting Contest (out of a normal 35 – 45), three Food Vendor applications (out of a normal 12 - 15), and two Craft Vendor applications (out of an expected 25 - 35).

These numbers may seem small, but experience tells us that, now that the curve has begun to inflect upwards, the pace will only increase, right up to the April 20th deadline for Performers and Songwriters; the vendor deadlines are July 15th. In past years, the last week before the deadline saw as many as 20 Performer applications come in in a day, so no need to worry about us coming up short in any category!


April Coffeehouse is Open Mic Night

For April only, our Coffeehouse format will change and be solely an Open-Mic evening.


We invite all budding musicians, poets, and storytellers to step into t h é spotlight.

New Websites Up and Running!

Way back in November of 2021, 3RFS held a workshop to examine where the organization stood, and to set priorities for those things we wanted to undertake. Among the top priorities was to modernize and harmonize the various websites that we'd accreted (in an unplanned manner) over the years.

Now, about three-and-a-half years later, that goal is almost completely fulfilled!

Collaborating with local firm Artmil Design, we first built an entirely new tumbleweedfest.com, using the latest design tools for a modern, easily-maintainable site. That site, which went live in the fall of 2024, is a great introduction to TMF, and still maintains all the virtual performances since we had to go virtual in 2020!

Once the tumbleweedfest.com site was well underway, we also began the modernization process for the 3rfs.org website, which was maintained in straight HTML for many years by our late friend, Alan Gibbs and, upon his passing, was taken over by 3RFS Board Member-at-large David Carson. The new 3rfs.org site will have largely the same look-and-feel of the tumbleweedfest.com site, and will be just as easy to maintain. As of this writing, the behind-the-scenes actions necessary to "repoint" the site to its new host at Artmil design are underway, deep in the bowels of the internet.

We'd like to thank the folks at Artmil who have helped us achieve this by doing the heavy lifting of design and build of the new site, with much helpful advice to us to let us choose the exact things we wanted the sites to be! We especially acknowledge Wade Steel, designer extraordinaire, who did the most of it, and makes the most excellent instructional videos ever!

This has been the work of numerous people in 3RFS as well, including David Carson, Katrina Knight, and Chris Glanister. We're going to say that it's a job well done!
