Nancy K. Dillon in Concert

Sat. Oct. 18, 2025, 7:30 pm All Saints' Episcopal Church

We are thrilled to present Nancy K. Dillon for our October 18 concert. A songwriter, performer, and visual artist, Nancy comes to us from Seattle. She writes compellingly, poetically, and sometimes mysteriously, finding inspiration in dreams and traveling across the landscapes of the western U.S. Her family heritage in Ireland, Scotland. Europe, and Britain provides rich inspiration and little known facts, like her father fighting in the WW2 Battle of the Bulge, and her 7th great-grand-uncle in Scotland writing a treatise called Lex Rex ("the law is king") upon which the 2nd Amendment was based. Nancy grew up in central Oklahoma surrounded by music. With her father being a composer, professor, saxophonist, and church director, and her mother a former vocal teacher, it is not surprise that her talent blossomed. She performed in roots-based bands and was a backing vocalist and session singer until she decided to focus on songwriting in the new millennium. Her songs explore her American roots as well as her ancestral Celtic roots.

A veteran Tumbleweed performer, she has three full length CDs and an EP, as well as singles, all available on Bandcamp. Her 2018 CD, *A Game of Swans*, debuted in the Top 20 of the Folk Alliance Folk Radio Chart. It was subsequently released in Europe and the UK where it received extensive air play. A fourth album *Cawker City Blues*, is scheduled for release this year.

His humor was never more apparent than in his musical imitations of famous performers (e.g., Elvis, Neil Diamond, Johnny Cash, others) doing such songs as "I'm a Little Tea Pot". Matt will be sorely missed in our community, and our hearts go out to his wife, Lona.

LÎ Da Corsi is a retired Director of Public Works for the City of Prosser. A proud veteran of the United States Coast Guard, he and his wife, Kimberly Starr, share a blended family of four grown children (one deceased) and are blessed with five grandchildren-four girls and one boy. LJ picked up the guitar at age 14, with Ride Captain, Ride by Blues Image as his very first song. A selftaught musician who is still learning and growing, he explores a wide range of genres including rock, soft rock, folk, country, Christian gospel, old-time gospel, bluegrass, old-time fiddle backup, Broadway, jazz, swing, and western swing.

In addition to performing as an occasional pit musician at the Princess Theatre in Prosser, LJ has been part of successful groups such as Travelin' Shoes (old-time gospel) and Private Reserve Jazz (Broadway and popular jazz), a five-piece combo that included his wife Kimberly, as lead vocalist. These days, he can often be found in spirited jam sessions with fellow musicians Alan Page, and Prosser pickers Mike Means and Paul Nicodemus.

Kimberly A. Starr's first performance was as a tightrope walker in her kindergarten class circus, sparking a lifelong passion for theatre and music.

She holds a BA in Theatre from Whitman College and an MA in Theatre Production from CWU, has taught theatre at the high school and college levels, worked both on and off for numerous productions, performed as lead singer for Private Reserve, a local jazz combo, as well as singing at private and public functions. She's thrilled to perform tonight with her husband, LJ,

and other talented musicians.

Alan Page (perhaps a "talented musician") is a freelance whisky drinker and is looking to pad his retirement income from tonight's coffeehouse (so give generously). He also drums with a local band and once tried out for Drum Major in high school. Not being chosen led him to years of playing the saxophone through high school and college. He eventually gave the saxophone away to the neighbor kids and picked up guitar and percussion instruments. He continues to learn and explore music and is looking forward to tonight.
