The Whateverly Brothers

Sun. Dec. 14, 2025, 3 pm All Saints' Episcopal Church

Get ready for some seasonal cheer as we welcome the Whateverly Brothers at a new time and date from our normal concerts. They will be appearing on Sunday, December 14th at 3 pm. At the same venue: All Saints' Episcopal Church, 1322 Kimball Ave., Richland.

In case you are unfamiliar with the Whaterverly Brothers, they are a maritime-themed group who does MUCH more, and for this concert, they will pull from their Yuletide Concert repertoire, from their yearly December Seattle event. They consistently delight audiences with their shimmering harmonies, striking arrangements, and offbeat humor.

Starting as a mainly maritime music band over twelve years ago, The Whateverly Brothers have broadened their repertoire considerably. Original member Dan Roberts plays guitar, mountain dulcimer, and mandolin, and sings bass. Chris Glanister came in early with a fine tenor voice, tenor banjo, cittern, whistle, mandolin, and, more recently, guitar. Their newest member, Bill Murlin, has a strong background in folk music and is a Woody Guthrie enthusiast and researcher. He has performed with several groups at the Tumbleweed Music Festival and is no stranger to the Tri-Cities folk music scene. He has recently moved from Portland to Seattle and is excited to join the Bros.



With the Whateverly Brothers, you can expect a variety of genres, varied instrumental textures, tight harmonies, and madcap humor. They have performed at almost every Tumbleweed Festival; Chris is the regular soundman at our physical North Stage.

3RFS Concert Season Features Some of the Best-Loved **Performers in the Northwest**

Get ready for the dynamite lineup that 3RFS has put together for you in the coming months. If you are a regular attender of our shows, you already love most of these old friends, so you might as well put a red circle around the third Saturday of every month, then sail on down to All Saints' around 7:20 pm each respective evening. This year, all of our concerts will be at All Saints' Episcopal Church in Richland, and with only 2 exceptions, they will start

at 7:30 pm.

On November 15th, we had Heidi Muller and Bob Webb. Heidi's strong, sensitive lyrics and warm voice are unforgettable, and we hope you enjoyed the performance. Our concert December 14th with the Whateverly Brothers is one of the calendar exceptions as it is on a Sunday and starts earlier at 3:00 PM. Dan Roberts, Chris Glanester, and Bill Murlin will bring a blend of tight harmonies, clever arrangements, and a touch of offbeat humor to the stage. Then join us on January 17th for an evening with the Blue Ribbon Tea Co. Bill and Kathy Kostelec offer us heartfelt, authentic music with real depth and sometimes a little grit.

You will not want to miss our concert Tumbleweed Festival on February 21st with Trilium-239. Our homegrown acoustic trio of Janet Humphrey, Hartman, and Cameron blends cello, guitar, and banjo with strong harmonies. Their music is known for its not-so-subtle social commentary and humor. On March 21st we are inviting Hank Cramer to do a "real" concert for us. Which is unusual because it can be hard to tie Hank down and get him to money. He donates extraordinary amount of his time and energy to supporting other musicians and causes. Known for his deep bass voice and broad repertoire, he often weaves history and music together and is often joined on stage by many other Northwest musicians. On April 18th, Blues return to the Tri-Cities with the seasoned acoustic guitar and vocals of Michael "Hawkeye" Herman. He has been gone too long. When the Hawk is in town, you can also count on getting a traditional blues workshop.

In May, we have 2 concerts. The first is on May 2nd with Sofia Talvik. Sofia performs folk and Americana music with Nordic influences. Then, on May 16th, we will welcome again to our stage the rich vocals and versatile guitar playing of Tracy Spring. Her music blends elements of blues, swing, jazz, and folk. This May concert will be offered free to members as it is held in conjunction with our annual membership meeting. But stay tuned in! A songwriting workshop with Tracy is also very likely.
